### **Apprenticeship**

In Medieval times, young men were "apprenticed" to a Master Craftsman to learn a skill or trade, eventually moving up to Fellow-craft or Journeyman and after learning, practicing and being tested regarding all aspects of their craft, the one-time apprentice could become a Master himself. The factor that made this practice successful (in most cases) was that the apprentice had a commitment to that particular trade and that particular master craftsman. There are a variety of trades today that advocate and practice apprenticeship programs. Electricians, plumbers, carpenters, stone masons, machinists, butchers, doctors (the AMA calls the program Internship and Residency) all go through a structured educational program where the Apprentice or Journeyman learns the rules, laws and techniques of their chosen trade and then demonstrate their proficiency in these skills and techniques under the supervision of a Master. Just a note, no one expects a Doctor to graduate from Medical School on Friday and be a qualified surgeon on Monday. This approach has kept the world supplied with skilled tradesmen (and doctors) for hundreds of years.

So how do we keep the world supplied with Freemasons for the next 500 years? First, we are committed to

Freemasonry. We become an Entered Apprentice, demonstrating our proficiencies as we advance to Fellow-craft and then Master Mason. It is our commitment to Masonry that will assure that a Lodge continues into perpetuity.

For a Lodge to survive and prosper, there needs to be a continuous line of officers, each progressing through their own "apprenticeship" for each chair. The requirements and proficiencies for advancement are well defined.

Speculative Masons, who are; 1) interested in "improving themselves in Masonry", 2) focused on the "good of the Lodge" and 3) are invested in the "three principle tenets", might seek a position as a Lodge officer. You might consider that phoning a brother for information is the same as knocking on their (electronic) door. They will find a plethora of current Masters, and Past Masters they can ask for aid and assistance in completing the proficiencies for each chair. Depending on the individual, the journey may take up to 7 years. It just takes a commitment to



Hello from the south! Welcome to March. In February we had an education night that went in to a bit of our symbolism. It was a great meeting and all the brethren that attended had a lot of fun learning and discussing symbolism. There is a substantial mythos surrounding symbolism. Masons tend to enjoy this mythos the most.

As children our study of symbolism begins earlier than we may think. We get exposed to the "magical" idea of symbols early. Children's cartoons and nursery rhymes are filled with wizards and witches casting magic spells usually speaking certain words or drawing certain characters. We also begin learning our alphabet and numbers. What we normally don't acknowledge is that these are symbols as equally as any symbols we use as Masons. The number 1 is the number 1 only because we all agree on its meaning.

But we as Masons are in a special situation. We don't always agree on the meaning of our symbols. And therein lies the beauty of Freemasonry. We allow a certain degree of personal interpretation. There is a certain freedom to the symbolism in Freemasonry that applies to the individual perceiving the symbol. There are lodges that focus on dissecting our symbols and finding as much meaning as possible within them.

There are other lodges that take just the basic meaning of our symbols and leave it at that. Both approaches are correct and noble. I urge each of you to pick a masonic symbol and learn more about it. You may be surprised to find information exists about that symbol you were not aware of previously. Enjoy the journey!

### **Proposed By-Laws Changes**

(From whom else: the Secretary; for more info read his article on page 5)

Here is a general summary of the by-laws changes that were proposed at the February stated meeting:

- Article 2, New Section 2 adding a restriction about being an elected officer in another lodge while serving as an elected officer in Tucson 4.
- Article 3, New Section 3 allowing the Master, Secretary, and Treasurer to pay all routine and normal bills during the time the lodge may be dark when directed by local governments or the Grand Lodge.
- Article 8, Section 1, Paragraph B delete as it has been removed from the AMC and is no longer necessary.
- Article 8, Add new Section 2 fees for petitions and applications for affiliations must be included with the petition and application before they can be read (somehow was removed from the by-laws in between printings)
- Article 12, Section 1 Add item L Masonic Education (if desired) and renumber rest of items
- Article 13, Section 2 adding the secretary as a non-voting observer to the trustees.
- Removing annotations of deleted paragraphs and subsequent renumbering.

These changes will be voted on at the March stated meeting.








