Principles, Precepts and Symbols

One of the many ways that the human race moves forward is that we are able to build on previous knowledge. By quantifying "best practices", we are able to constantly move forward the starting point of every process. If we were not able to build on our prior experience, each generation would still be inventing the wheel and how to start a fire. Knowledge was originally handed down by verbal tradition (tribal knowledge). Written language started out as symbols e.g. Egyptian hieroglyphs, Mayan, etc and eventually developed into an alphabet, which could convey complex concepts with less ambiguity. Symbols are still very effective ways of communicating massive amounts of information quickly. Consider the symbols for "Radioactive Material" or "Flammable".

The same may be true for concepts and practices. If a concept rings true for some period of time, say 200 years, it might then become an accepted practice. And so, symbols, concepts and practices, which originated thousands of years ago are passed on and adopted by

- Practicing moderation in all things.


Needless to say, the precepts of Zoroastrianism have influenced succeeding organizations and religions for thousands of years



As Free and Accepted Masons, we embrace many of these precepts by acting upon the Square, keeping a tongue of good report, and practicing charity.





SYMBOLIC TIME

To help, aid, and assist in dividing their time Brethren had available to them, at one time, an instrument so unique that it is now considered a rare collectible. "The Dudley Masonic Emblem Watch" was the creation of a former Hamilton Watch Company superintendent named William Wallace Dudley who, at the age of 69, left Hamilton, financed a small factory, and started his own watch company.

The figures on the dial of this unique time-piece consisted of 11 Masonic symbols, one omitted to make room for the dialette, but the distinguishing feature of the watch is its movement. The plates and bridges were constructed of the Masonic emblems of the



Dudley engineered the watch along the designs of one of the best Hamilton watches, changed to fit the Masonic plates. The Square and Compass supported the mainspring barrel and the Trowel supported the balance. Cases were available in a glass back or a metal flip-open back so the movement could be viewed.

Three models were produced. Model 1 can be distinguished by the "Holy Bible" engraved on the winding arbor plate, Model 2 had a flat silver-colored Holy Bible, and Model 3 had a silver Holy Bible riveted in place.

Although an excellent watchmaker, Dudley was a poor businessman. His company was heavily in debt and he filed a petition of bankruptcy on February 20, 1925. Due to low production, and with fewer than 2,500 known to exist today, prices for a "Dudley Masonic Emblem Watch" could range from \$1,400 to \$10,000depending on condition, model, and serial numbermaking it a cherished and, indeed, valuable instrument.

From The Secretary



As we have just passed the mid-point of the masonic year, we can look back at the first half of the year. We started the year with 236 members, we had 4 brothers ascend to the Celestial Lodge Above and 1 withdraw (a correction from last year). We raised one new brother and had an affiliation. As of the writing of this we have 233 members. We have conferred 4 degrees – 2 Entered Apprentices, 1 Fellow Craft, and 1 Master Mason. We have another Master Mason degree that will occur before you read this. Of our 233 members, we pay per-capita on 204 of them. The difference between the two numbers is made up of our Senior Life and Regulation 19 members. Of these 204 members, roughly 160 of them are dues paying.

The by-laws committee will be reconvening in the near future to readdress the proposed changes from last spring. We put the changes on hold as the Grand Lodge Charter and By-Laws Committee changed their submission date so it fell before we could vote on them. When we vote to change our by-laws, we then submit them to the Grand Lodge committee who reviews them. From there they go to the Grand Master, and they get the final approval at the subsequent Grand Lodge. It is like mating elephants – a lot of trumpeting and takes forever to see any results.

I am expecting to receive the revised Arizona Constitution and Statutes (aka the Code or RAMS) any day now. Once I receive it, I will let everyone know. Hopefully, an announcement will be sent out via Grandview and you should receive it there if you have activated your account. Right now, only about 30% of the members have activated their accounts. If you haven't done so already, please let me know and I can send you the information and walk you through it. One item of good news from the Annual Communication is that our per capita will remain at \$38.00. What that really means to everyone is the 2023 dues will remain at \$122. We will always accept donations from those who don't have to pay dues.

For a little bit of housekeeping for those of you who might have any old blank petitions or applications for affiliation lying around (Forms 1, 2A, 2B, and 2C), please destroy them. These were just updated to align with Grandview and all of them have a 4/2022 date after the form number. I have been instructed not to accept any of the old forms.

Finally, if you remember the last edition of the trestle board and the fun our editor had, my vote is #3.
