The Senior Warden is always stationed in the West, and the Junior Warden is always stationed in the South. On this, we can agree. On this basis, the East being the Master makes sense—it is his station. The sun is the Senior Deacon's symbol, and the moon is that of the Junior Deacon. S, does the moon come before the sun? Not usually.

Let's look at another. Did you know that the Lesser Lights also represent three Great Pillars? W, S & B. We all know those also go in order. E, W & S. I welcome any that wish to contradict this. If there is logic to the reasoning, I will gladly listen to it.

Next, we look at the Circumpunct. I'm going to try to keep this short. There are many illustrations of what one should look like. The one in our lodge has the two lines vertical and not horizontal as most versions with lines is what you find. How old is it? From what little reading I have done; it dates back over 300,000 years. It alludes to the Supreme Architect of the Universe.

Both have meaning deeper than we teach in Freemasonry. There is a reason we use them. Do you know why? I think it is because Freemasonry is older than we think. I'm not telling you what to think. Only asking that you do reflect what they are to you.

The above quotes are only the headliners. How we achieve these goals requires study and commitment? How do you go about subduing your passions? Why act upon the square? Do we always act "on the level"? And never forget, each of us has invoked the favor of God in helping us to achieve these goals.

Now the real work begins, how to improve our -selves in Masonry? I submit that the study of the meanings of symbols, serious conversations with Brother Masons, reading the history and thoughts of previous Masons, and a serious commitment to the tenets of Masonry is one path to self-improvement.

According to the <u>Masonic Service Association</u> <u>of America</u>, Masonry is "A Fraternity", "It is not a benefit society", "It seeks no advantage for its members through business or politics", "It is a way of life", and "It is a system of moral conduct". We may only meet once a month for a few hours for our Stated Meeting, but we are (or should be) Masons true to our obligations 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Consider the difference between legal, moral and unethical. An act may be unethical and morally reprehensible and still be legal. Years ago there was a car dealer in Tucson whose contracts stated that if the purchaser was more that 24 hours late in the monthly payment, the

DWELLING IN UNITY

In Psalm 133, there are words that we, as Masons are very familiar with. They are as follows:

Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity! It is like precious oil upon the head, running down upon the beard, upon the beard of Aaron running down on the collar of his robes! It is like the dew of Hermon, which falls on the mountains of Zion. For there the Lord commanded the blessing, life for evermore.

I wonder if we are able to catch all that the writer is trying to impart! These are words that are filled with deep meaning. They are words that need to be heard in the society in which we live. Today our society and our world are in desperate need of the message that is given in these three short verses. The profound message that is here, should go deep within the inner recesses of our being and help us to come to a better understanding of what unity is all about.

The Psalmist begins with a very simple statement: "Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity!" As we begin, let it be understood that when the Psalmist uses the word "brothers," we must insert "sisters," or any combination where two or three are involved. And, we will want to explore the implications when we expand this idea to encompass the world.

Can we bring ourselves to experience what the Psalmist is talking? Do you know the feeling of what life is like when there is harmony, understanding and acceptance?


